Mobile Phone Policy

We also want to remind you to take a moment to read the new mobile phone policy available on our school website. Starting in September, all mobile phones should be turned off and stored in your child's bag throughout the school day. Phones should not be seen or heard. This policy is in place to minimise distractions and ensure that pupils remain focused on their learning and interactions within the school.

Importance of No Phones

The rationale behind this policy is to create an environment free from the disruptions and distractions caused by mobile phones. We believe that limiting phone use during school hours will help pupils to concentrate better, engage more fully in classroom activities and foster face-to-face communication skills.

PASTORAL UPDATE - ATTENDANCE



Penalty Notice Fines for school Attendance are Changing!

- A new National Framework for Penalty Notices has been introduced.
- The new regulations will come into effect from the 19th of August 2024.
- The Aim is to improve consistency in the use of penalty notices across England

Per Parent, Per Child

Penalty Notice Fine will be issued to each parent, for each child that was absent. For example, 3 siblings absent for Term Time Leave, would result in each parent or carer receiving 3 separate fines.

First Offence

The first time a penalty notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child – if paid within 28 days, this will be reduced to £80 per parent, per child, paid within 21 days.

5 consecutive days of term time leave

Penalty notices will be issued for a Term Time Leave of 5 or more consecutive days.

Second Offence

This is within 3 years.

The second time a penalty notice is issued for Term Time Leave or irregular absence, the amount will be £160 per parent, per child to be paid with 28 days.

10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10 week period

2 sessions = 1 day
Penalty notice will be considered when there has been 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10 week period.

Further Offences

This is within 3 years

The third time and any further time an offence is committed for Term Time Leave or irregular attendance, a penalty notice will be issued. The case will be presented straight to Magistrates' Court. Magistrates' fines can be up to £2500 per parent, per child. Cases found guilty in a Magistrates' Court can be shown on the parents' future DBS certificate, due to 'failure to safeguard a child's education.'

CATHOLIC LIFE: THE GOSPEL - MARK 6: 7-13

Jesus made a tour round the villages, teaching. Then he summoned the Twelve and began to send them out in pairs giving them authority over the unclean spirits. And he instructed them to take nothing for the journey except a staff – no bread, no haversack, no coppers for their purses. They were to wear sandals but, he added, 'Do not take a spare tunic.' And he said to them, 'If you enter a house anywhere, stay there until you leave the district. And if any place does not welcome you and people refuse to listen to you, as you walk away shake off the dust from under your feet as a sign to them.' So they set off to preach repentance; and they cast out many devils, and anointed many sick people with oil and cured them.

This passage is about going out and living Jesus' teachings. Going out and doing what is right and good in our lives.

At the end of our academic year, we naturally reflect on what has been; we think carefully about what we have done as a school to live out our mission at Archbishop Ilsley and we would like to extend our heartfelt thanks to all of the staff who are leaving us this year having been faithful to that mission. 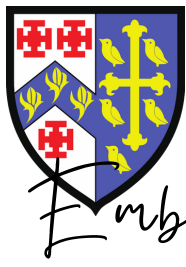

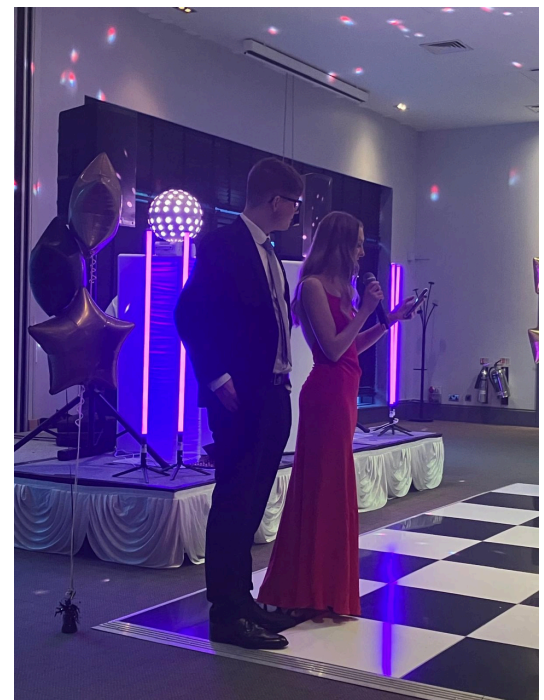

TYSELEY AND HAY MILLS LIVEABLE NEIGHBOURHOODS PROJECT



Birmingham City Council is currently undergoing unprecedented change due to its economic circumstances and is now in the process of reshaping the services that it offers. Residents will be at the heart of this recovery journey, along with working in new and more efficient ways and with other partners in the city.

The council continues to have ambitious plans for Birmingham, for it to become a healthier, better connected and thriving city.

At a local level, the Council is working with partners such as the Tyseley Strategic Alliance and through the East Birmingham Inclusive Growth Programme, and it is hoped that the Liveable Neighbourhoods Project will help to reduce health, social, environmental and economic inequalities faced by residents in Tyseley and Hay Mills. The vision for the project is:

"All residents within the area will have sustainable access to a pleasant, safe, welcoming, green, inclusive environment, and are able to access the quality key facilities and services they need to lead full, healthy, happy, and purposeful lives, within a short walk or cycle of their homes."



Survey - £100 Cash Prize!

As part of working in new ways, the Council has secured funding from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund to carry out engagement with local residents on this project between May and November 2024.

We want to hear the views of local residents and community partners and build upon the excellent work that has already been done to date. These views will help to inform the development of a 20-year strategy and action plan, to deliver meaningful changes and opportunities, to improve local skills and access to jobs, encourage active lifestyles, provide the right services, enhance the environment and reduce local carbon emissions.
