Happy New Year to all our parents, pupils, carers, students and friends of Archbishop IIsley!!






CATHOLIC LIFE - THE FEAST OF THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke.

At that time: As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Christ, John answered them all, saying, 'I baptise you with water, but he who is mightier than I is coming, the strap of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie. He will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire.'

Now when all the people were baptised by John the Baptist and when Jesus also had been baptised and was praying, the heavens



were opened, and the Holy Spirit descended on him in bodily form, like a dove; and a voice came from heaven, 'You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased.'

Let us reflect:

Jesus' baptism marks the start of His mission. By entering the waters, He steps into His mission of cleansing through repentance and conversion. The heavenly voice proclaiming Jesus as the beloved Son confirms His anointing by the Spirit for this mission.

YEAR OF JUBILEE 2025

The Holy Father has decided that 2025 will be a year of Jubilee. The theme is "Pilgrims of Hope" and is a year of hope for a world suffering the impacts of war, the ongoing effects of COVID-19 pandemic, and a climate crisis.



The Pilgrims of Hope Jubilee presents each one of us with an opportunity to reignite the flame of our faith in our own hearts and to share the light of that faith with those in darkness.

The concept of Jubilee is one rooted in the earliest days of Judeo-Christian tradition. In the Book of Leviticus, we read that the people of Israel celebrated this tradition every 50 years. Its purpose was to re-establish a proper relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation. It involved the forgiveness of debts, the return of misappropriated land, and a fallow period for the fields. Today, the Catholic Church celebrates this tradition once every 25 years as a year of grace, offering the faithful the opportunity to renew faith through prayer, pilgrimage, acts of charity, and by asking for a plenary indulgence – a special grace that strengthens our wounded souls in the fight against sin. As a school we will be launching this special event in the coming weeks and our school will join other schools in the Diocese in celebration.

NEW YEAR RESOLUTIONS

January is the month where we all make resolutions aimed at making us better; gyms and fitness classes are busier, we might be trying to eat more healthily, spend less money, save more or take up new hobbies. In our assemblies over the last two weeks, we have considered the success rate of people making grand resolutions and instead thought about the little things that we can do to make us better; importantly, we have thought about the little things that we can do to make us better; importantly, we have thought about the little things that we can do to make us better; importantly, we have thought about the little things that we can do to make and we can make, the new habits that we can form and keep. I shared my '10 life hacks for Sixth Form' with students and we are going to really work on these this half term!

1. Remember why you chose Sixth Form!

2. Systems: Be organised - The start of a new year is the ideal time to get into some good study habits, as these will help our students to get the best possible A-level grades, as well as standing them in good stead for degree level study and beyond. This half term our tutor programme is all about Systems; teaching students about the importance of routines, routines that incorporate study time, the use of 'To Do' lists to help students maximise their productivity and prioritise homework tasks and active revision strategies. One of the best things that students can do is revise as they go along by revisiting topics in order to learn them more deeply and commit them to long term memory. This will reduce their revision workload nearer to exam time as when they come to revise the topics, they will be revisiting content that they already understand and are familiar with. After a class, students should get into the habit of reading over what they learned, in order to consolidate their new knowledge; they could make flashcards with short snippets of useful information on. These can then be used by students to self quiz both days and months down the line.

- 3. Complete further reading around subjects
- 4. Consolidation from the off. Use active study strategies; Cornell Notes, flashcards, self quizzing
- 5. Study periods use them wisely
- 6. Speak with your teachers they are the experts! Ask advice; ask for help!
- 7. Get involved
- 8. Think carefully about outside school commitments, especially part-time jobs
- 9. Sleep
- 10. Enjoy it!

YEAR 12 ACADEMIC REPORT 1

On Friday 10th January Year 12 parents and carers received their child's first KS5 Academic Report. The reports detailed Working at Grades which are the grades for their first examination in each subject. There were then grades for Effort, Behaviour for Learning and Homework. In some respects, these are the most important grades at this stage. If Effort, Behaviour for Learning and Homework grades are at As or Bs, a student will be successful in their studies with us. In almost every discipline, success comes from a combination of talent and grit. But if you listen to most famous figures describe their life journeys, you'll hear them waxing lyrical about their hard work, while strangely downplaying the role of their innate abilities.

Thomas Edison may be the most often quoted, with his claim that, "genius is one percent inspiration and ninetynine percent perspiration" but many other variations exist. Just consider Octavia Butler's advice for new writers. "Forget talent. If you have it, fine. Use it. If you don't have it, it doesn't matter. As habit is more dependable than inspiration, continued learning is more dependable than talent." The Portuguese footballer Cristiano Ronaldo also emphasises the blood, sweat and tears that went into his training. "Talent without work is nothing," he said, when asked about the secrets of his success on the pitch. In the coming weeks, the Sixth Form Team will be talking to every student about their report and setting SMART targets with them.
