MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER - MR CLINTON

Then we had Friday prayers at lunchtime led by Imam Mohammed Ahmed – one of the most wonderful experiences I have been involved with in my 26 months at Ilsley. Then we had the almsgiving of a visit to the Catholic charity, St Chad's sanctuary. And on Saturday, Deacon Tim was down at Wembley for the Flame Concert... he just checking everything was ok for when Aston Villa visit there next month.

On Wednesday, we had another great event: our first Grand Iftar. You can read more about it on the pages that follow. There are so many parallels between Catholicism and Islam, in fact Jesus is mentioned in the Quran many times. Both faiths teach love for God and neighbour, humility and the importance of charity. Our acts of charity, whether through Lent or Zakat in Islam, remind us of our duty to care for the poor and vulnerable. Both traditions also emphasise prayer, self-discipline and gratitude to God.

By fostering understanding, this emphasises that Archbishop IIsley is a community rooted in peace and mutual respect. Let us continue to learn from one another and build a school where all faiths and backgrounds are valued.

Following these values helps to create a positive and supportive school environment for everyone. Thank you for your continued support and engagement in school life. Let's keep working together to make a difference!


YEAR 10 - MR FRANCIOSO



Year 13 are now on the countdown to their final external examinations - the first A Level examination begins on Monday 12th May. It is therefore imperative that all Year 13 students are in school on time every single day in order to ensure that they can fully access the guidance and expertise of their subject teachers. Students are also fully aware of the need to be working outside of the classroom revising content and using past questions.

It is also important that students are mentally prepared for their examinations. Ensuring that they have sensible sleeping patterns, are eating healthily and engaging in exercise is all good preparation for exam success. I would also urge parents and carers to monitor the number of hours that students are working if they have a part time job. We advise that students undertake no more that ten hours of employment.

In their Aspire session on Wednesday, students were encouraged to reflect on what positive mental health and well being looks like in order to recognise and understand how to address signs of stress or anxiety. It is natural at this time, that our students may experience increased feelings of stress and anxiety. Tutors, teachers and the Sixth Form team are always available to support students. Please see below the following advice regarding how you might be able to further support your child before their exams:

THE IMPORTANCE OF LEARNING ABOUT WELLBEING AND MENTAL HEALTH BEFORE EXTERNAL EXAMINATIONS

For students preparing for external exams, understanding wellbeing and mental health is crucial. Exams can be a significant source of stress, and learning how to manage mental health effectively can improve both academic performance and overall well-being.

- 1. Managing Stress and Anxiety External exams often bring pressure to perform well, which can lead to high levels of stress and anxiety. Learning stress-management techniques, such as mindfulness, time management, and relaxation exercises, helps students stay calm and focused.
- 2. Building Resilience Resilience allows students to cope with setbacks, such as difficult exam questions or lower-than-expected results. Understanding mental health encourages a growth mindset, helping students see challenges as opportunities for learning rather than failures.
- 3. Enhancing Concentration and Productivity A healthy mind leads to better focus and productivity. Learning about mental well-being encourages students to get enough sleep, exercise, and maintain a balanced diet—factors that improve concentration and cognitive function during revision and exams.
- 4. Encouraging Healthy Coping Mechanisms Without awareness, students may turn to unhealthy coping strategies like excessive caffeine, poor sleep habits, or avoidance. Education on mental health promotes positive coping mechanisms such as deep breathing, physical activity, and seeking support when needed.
- 5. Reducing Burnout Constant studying without breaks can lead to burnout, reducing motivation and effectiveness. Understanding wellbeing helps students recognise signs of burnout and implement self-care strategies to maintain a sustainable study routine.
- 6. Promoting a Balanced Approach to Success Exams are important, but they do not define a person's worth.

 Learning about mental health encourages students to adopt a balanced approach, recognising that success also includes personal growth, relationships, and well-being.
- 7. By prioritising mental health education before exams, students can develop the emotional resilience and selfcare strategies needed to perform their best while maintaining a positive mindset.



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In Year 12, their Aspire session focused on the importance of healthy friendships. By understanding the importance of friendships, our students can build positive relationships that enhance their academic, personal and professional lives. In their sessions they explored the following ideas:

- 1. Emotional Well-being Friendships provide emotional support, helping students navigate the stresses of A-levels, university applications and future career decisions. Positive friendships can boost self-esteem and reduce anxiety.
- 2. Social Skills and Communication At this stage, students refine their interpersonal skills, including conflict resolution, empathy and active listening—key attributes for personal and professional success.
- 3. Personal Growth & Identity Friendships help shape a student's identity, values, and decision-making. By interacting with diverse groups, they develop a broader perspective and a stronger sense of self.
- 4. Academic and Career Benefits Strong peer networks can provide academic motivation, study support, and future career opportunities. Learning to build and maintain healthy relationships is vital in both educational and professional settings.
- 5. Healthy vs. Toxic Friendships Students need to recognise the difference between supportive friendships and toxic ones, ensuring they set boundaries and prioritise mental health.
- 6. Independence and Responsibility As they prepare for adulthood, students learn to manage friendships alongside increasing responsibilities, helping them develop balance and independence.

SUBJECT ENRICHMENT: EXTENDED PROJECT AND CORE MATHEMATICS

In Year 12 students undertake an enrichment subject, either the Extended Project Qualification or Core Mathematics. These subjects are equivalent to an AS Level and so carry all important UCAS points. When students are considering their university options, they will see that all courses have an entry criteria; either universities are looking for a particular set of grades or they will require students to have a particular amount of UCAS tariff points. All grades awarded at Level 3 carry UCAS points - Grade A*, 56 UCAS points; Grade A, 48 UCAS points; Grade C, 32 UCAS points; Grade D, 24 UCAS points; Grade E, 16 UCAS points.

Therefore, securing a good grade in their enrichment subject is very important. University's also welcome the skills that each qualification teaches. The Core Mathematics Exam is on Thursday 15th May; students have completed their course and are now working through practice papers. The EPQ deadline is Monday 24th March. Students must submit their first draft to their teachers. Please discuss this with your child; thank you in advance for your support.

FLAME 2025

On Saturday 15th March, Deacon Tim and Father Marco along with a number of Sixth Formers attended the annual Flame youth event at Wembley Arena. Flame is the largest Catholic Youth event in the United Klngdom. Picking up on the theme for the Jubilee Year, "Pilgrims of Hope" the Flame theme for this year was "Unstoppable" – Fan the Flame of Hope. It was a wonderful occasion attended by over 10,000 Catholics from across the country. It is very true to say that teachings of Jesus Christ help every one of us spread hope, joy and peace throughout our school, local, national and international community.
