Why is Archbishop Ilsley called... Archbishop Ilsley!?

Archbishop Ilsley is named after someone called Edward Ilsley. Edward Ilsley was born in Stafford in 1840. He was a priest up the road in Olton. He was passionate about the education and welfare of children living in Acocks Green and East Birmingham. He was very worried that so many children were living in poverty in the 19th century. Ilsley's main concern was that they should be cared for but also should be given a Catholic education. He was a champion of the local youth in the area. In 1905, it was said that in the Catholic circles in the Midlands, there was no one as loved as Edward Ilsley. After being promoted to bishop in 1888, he was appointed the first Archbishop of Birmingham in 1911. He died in 1926.

When a Catholic School was built in Acocks Green in 1957, it was decided to name it after Edward Ilsley, who had died 30 years earlier, as he had been so passionate about Catholic education and for caring for the local children.

Edward Ilsley is not a saint. However, if you pray for him privately and a miracle happens, YOU could set him on the road to becoming one! Maybe then Archbishop Ilsley would be renamed St Edward's Catholic School. Get praying!!

Catholic Life at Archbishop Ilsley

Our faith is at the heart of our school. Every pupil prays each day in form or collective worship and regularly attends Holy Mass with their year group and for Holy Days of Obligation. The theological virtues of faith, hope and love are the basis of our charitable works within school and in the wider community; notably our tradition of creating Christmas hampers and Lenten fundraising for local, national and international charities. There are opportunities for pupils to join groups for liturgy, charity and co-ordinating collective worship, and to join day and residential pilgrimages. Throughout the school year we reflect on different aspects of Catholic Social Teaching and the example of different saints.



We have a dedicated school chapel in which the Blessed Sacrament is present in the tabernacle. The chapel is open as a quiet space all day every day, and regularly used for prayer groups and liturgies. We have two deacons on our staff who support the liturgical life of the school, allowing groups to regularly attend periods of Adoration and Benediction in the chapel.

As part of the Saint Teresa of Calcutta MAC we work with our sister schools to develop the spiritual life of all of our pupils, from ages 4 to 18. We have close links with our parish of Sacred Heart and Holy Souls, regularly travelling to the church for Holy Mass and welcoming our priest chaplain into school. As well as generously celebrating our school masses, our chaplain co-ordinates regular opportunities for the Sacrament of Penance and visits lessons and form groups.

Catholic Life at Archbishop Ilsley

Catholic translates as 'universal', this means that Christ's teachings are for everyone regardless of background. We believe and promote the message that every child is precious, unique and has a mission to use their gifts and talents to make the world around them more peaceful, loving and joyful. We carry out this mission by focusing on a different Catholic Social Teaching each half term. We refer to this in our lessons, assemblies and interactions with students so that it becomes the lived experience.



Day to day we focus on pupils and students becoming:

- 1. Wise, courageous learners
- 2. Dignified people with integrity

To build the understanding of the four virtues of Wisdom, Courage, Dignity and Integrity we use the following definitions.

Wisdom - to know what is right and good.

Courage - The strength to do what is right and good.

Dignity - Knowing that human life is precious and should be protected & respected.

Integrity - To do what is right, because it is right.

Features of the app include:



We will release more features in due course including enrolling for trips, viewing academic reports and exam timetables and much more. However, please make every effort to use this app now.





Reporting Pupil Absence

The MyChildAtSchool app (or website) can now be used for this. Simply click on the 'Report an Absence' button.



Your child and school attendance

- As a parent, you have a legal responsibility to make sure your child gets a full-time education between the ages of five and 16.
- You can be fined up to £2,500 or imprisoned if your child has a poor attendance record.
- If you have problems, your child's school and your local authority can help you get your child back into school.
- There will be times when your child cannot go to school: for example, if they are ill. But taking time off for holidays and birthdays is not acceptable.
- Taking an active interest in your child's education is vital to improving their chances of success.

Legal consequences – what could happen if your child truants from school?

- You may be prosecuted and, if convicted, will have a criminal record.
- For more serious offences, you can be fined up to £2,500 and/or sent to prison for up to three months.
- You could also be given a Parenting Order, which means you have to attend a parenting class.
- You may be issued with a penalty notice of £60 (rising to £120 if unpaid after 28 days). If you
 don't pay, you will be prosecuted.

Your child and school attendance

When is it OK for your child to stay away from school?

- Illness follow the school's illness procedures and let them know as soon as possible on the first day that your child is ill, by ringing the absent line on 0121 706 4200 opt 1 and leave a message or emailing enquiry@ilsley.bham.sch.uk
- **Medical appointments** try to arrange them during school holidays, at weekends or after school hours. Naturally, there will be times when this isn't possible, but try to give the school as much advance warning as possible. You will also have to provide proof of the appointment.
- Bereavements let your school know as soon as possible if someone in your family dies the school will want to make sure that staff and pupils act sensitively with your child on their return.
- Exclusion if your child has seriously misbehaved and the Head Teacher issues a letter saying they must stay away either permanently or for a set number of days (up to 45). If the exclusion is permanent, your child will be offered alternative education
- Religious festivals ask your school well in advance for time off for religious reasons.

Attendance at Archbishop Ilsley

We work with parents to improve school attendance. Good attendance will mean that your child is able to achieve the best grades for their ability and have real opportunity in further education and the world of work. Absence disrupts the education of the individual pupil and the whole class.

In line with Birmingham City Council Local Education Authority's instructions schools are expected to have a minimum of 95% attendance. In order to fulfil this, we will be continuing the following measures;

- Under 95% attendance Parents will be invited into school for an attendance meeting where an 'Individual Attendance Plan' will be formulated and monitored.
- 20 or more unauthorised absences may result in legal action being taken.
- Archbishop Ilsley do not authorise leave during term time. If you decide to take leave, the absence will be marked as unauthorised and may result in a Penalty Notice being issued or legal action being taken.

Section 444 of the Education Act 1996 states that:






Archbishop Ilsley Catholic School is a cashless school and uses Parentmail. Parent/carers are able to add and top up dinner money, pay for school trips and purchase other materials such as GCSE revision guides etc.


- You can either download the Parentmail app or go online type in Parentmail and be taken to the website to log in.
- It is really important we have your correct email address because we will be sending out your Parentmail invites via the email address you provide. You will receive these via email sometime in August; Please note the invite might go to your junk mail so you may need to check there. You will need to open the email and clink on the link to register.
- The attached Quick Guide explains how to top up dinner money and make purchases for things such as trips etc.
- To add dinner money or top up you will need to go to Accounts →click dinner top up→ then
 follow the instructions we have provided in the attached document.
- To pay for a trip, you will need to go to Payments— then click the shopping trolley icon at the bottom of the screen. This will take you to a screen which will show you all of the things you are able to purchase. Select which item you would like to purchase and then follow the instructions we have provided in the attached document.

















Biometric Fingerprint system

Biometric information is information about someone's physical or behavioural characteristics that can be used to identify them. There are many possible biometrics, including for example, a digital photograph, fingerprint, or hand shapes. As part of our identity management systems, we will record biometric measurement taken from a finger, but not a fingerprint image. The information is stored in a highly secure database and will only be used by the school to confirm who is using a range of services. In future, we may use other biometric services where appropriate.

Our chosen solution allows us to use a secure database holding biometric data for use with a range of services. This means we will store the amount of data possible. This reduces the risk of loss of data.

The data that is held cannot be used by any other agency for any other purpose.

The school will not use the biometric information for any purpose other that the stated above. The school will store the biometric information collected securely in compliance with the Data Protection Act 1988. The school will not share this information with anyone else and will not unlawfully disclose it to any other person.

Current legislation - The Protection of Freedoms Act 2012 and the GDPR 25/05/2018

The legislation requires schools to:

- Inform parents about the use of biometric systems in the school and explain what applications use biometrics.
- Receive written permission from parent or guarding if the school is to continue procession biometrics for their child.
- Allow children to choose an alternative way of being identified if they wish.
- Please note that children under 18 who do not have permission will not be able to use exiting or new biometric system when using services in schools.

If you do nor wish your child to use the biometric system or your child chooses to use an alternative form of identification, we will provide reasonable alternative arrangements that allow them to access current and future services in the form of a PIN number.

NON-COMPLIANCE WITH SCHOOL UNIFORM

Non-compliance with regard to uniform is a breach of school rules. There are a range of consequences which can be issued, as appropriate:

- 1. Confiscations of inappropriate items(s)
- 2. Having to go home to get changed or clothes to be brought in by parent / carer
- 3. Having to wash off make-up
- 4. Having to remove nail varnish
- 5. Not being allowed to take part in an extra-curricular activity or event
- 6. Isolation
- 7. Detention

The school's decision is final.

Please note: the school will not accept a note for a student to wear trainers unless this is a note from a qualified doctor. Any other note will not be accepted.

We understand that for some families, finances are an issue. By doing all we can to eradicate fashion items at the school, we are helping all families in keeping costs down. Nevertheless, if you do have a particular problem, or you are unsure about an item of uniform, please do not hesitate to contact your child's Head of Year, who will deal with your enquiry in confidence.

We will contact home whenever there is a problem with uniform.

Rationale 'I have come that you might have life and have it to the full' (Jn.10.10)

We are all involved in relationships and sex education precisely because of our Christian beliefs about God and the human person. The belief in the unique dignity of the human person made in the image and likeness of God, underpins the approach to all education in a Catholic school. Our approach to RSE therefore is rooted in the Catholic Church's teaching of the human person and presented in a positive framework of Christian ideals.

Our RSE curriculum is taught using the TenTen Life to the full programme. There is a parent portal to view some of the resources and see an overview of the topics that are covered in each year group.

Ten Ten Resources

Ten Ten's programme, Life to the Full, teaches relationship, sex and health education (RSHE) within the context of a Christian understanding of human sexuality rooted in the wisdom and teaching of the Catholic Church.

Given that RSHE is a statutory subject for all schools, we are embracing "the challenges of creating a happy and successful adult life" by giving pupils knowledge "that will enable them to make informed decisions about their wellbeing, health and relationships" (DFE Statutory Guidance).

We will deliver this teaching through the prism of Catholic RSHE. The framework of our programme is taken from the Model Catholic RSE Programme by the Catholic Education Service, which has been highlighted by the Department of Education as a work of good practice.

Consequences for poor choices



C1: 1st verbal warning

Not recorded: directed at individual pupil. Teacher must explain why C1 has been given.

C2: 2nd verbal warning

If unacceptable behaviour continues, the teacher records a warning on Class Charts & explain why this has been given.

C3: 20-minute detention

-C3 recorded on Class Charts

-20-minute same day detention issued

C4: Removal from lesson

C4 recorded on Class
Charts. Adult called to escort
pupil to another room, usually
within the faculty. C3+
detention issued.

C3 detention

C3+ detention: 60 minutes

After school (Friday) with notice. Issued for:

-Failure to attend C3 detention

Out of lesson incidents, including internal truancy.

Repeated incidents will result in C5 or fixed-term suspension, depending on severity.

C5: Internal Seclusion

Issued for:

- 2 or more C4s in one day
- Any **serious** breach of the behaviour policy, in or out of lessons
- Length of time in IS to be determined by Senior staff: typically, 1-5 days (5 day max)

Guidance notes

C1 – C2 sanctions would typically be issued for behaviour that disrupts or prevents learning, e.g.: persistent talking/distracting others when the teacher is speaking; refusal to work; off-task behaviour. If repeated, these would lead to a C3.

Straight to C3: Behaviour that would warrant a pupil going 'straight to C3' would typically include defiance towards staff (e.g., refusal to follow basic instructions/arguing); use of foul language; negative language towards other pupils and/or arguing with others; littering.

Straight to C4: In lessons, a pupil should go straight to C4 for: use of discriminatory/sexualised language (and/or gestures); verbal abuse towards the teacher; repeated defiance/refusal to follow instructions; excessive physical contact with another pupil

Straight to C3+: Out of lesson behaviour that will result in an automatic C3+ detention will typically include: internal truancy; misuse of toilet facilities (e.g., sharing cubicles), excessive physical contact or fighting; verbal abuse of other pupils, including use of discriminatory/sexualised language; being out of bounds on the school site; unsafe behaviour on corridors/in communal areas.

Straight to C5: Out of lesson behaviour that will result in an automatic C5 sanction would typically include: insolent/defiant behaviour towards staff; vaping; smoking; vandalism; bullying (see separate policy).

For rules and sanctions related to **mobile phones**, see separate policy.






